been greeted with HAPPY BIRTHDAY greetings, was the winner of the door prize painting, donated, of course, by Harry Rossoll.

In connection with planned program for 1976, Russell pointed out that we were a social and friendly group and that program suggestions would be welcome. He wanted ideas from any and everyone about (1) how to utilize the funds which we have (2) how we could get more out of town members interested in attending our meetings (3) the Association arranging programs or other activities in the area in which a good many of them live. He also announced that a Board of Directors meeting would be held shortly after the first of the year as an organization meeting for 1976.

BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S MEETING

Was held at the home of Paul H. Russell on January 26, 197, with the following members and Committee Chairmen present: George K. Schaeffer, Tom Hunt, Bill Fischer, Bill Huber, Art Grumbine, Clint Herrick, C. M. Evenson, Dorothy Smith, Lew Whipple, Grady Burnett, H. C. Eriksson and Paul Russell.

The purpose of the meeting was stated as an organizational meeting for 1976. The minutes of the previous meeting were not read, but accepted as published in Dixie-Ranger Vol. V NUMBER I, and most of those present had attended the previous meeting.

Treasurer reported a total balance of \$761.49 in the account and requested permission to switch money from the savings account, as needed, which request was approved. He reported that the balance of the account has dropped over the previous years and cited the reason for non-payment of dues.

The officers for 1976 were announced as shown on the first page of this newsletter.

Question was raised as to whether we needed a Historical Committee. In view of what the R. O. and some of the National Forests are doing in trying to work up historical data for R-8 and individual forests, it was decided to continue the Committee as a liaison between the RO and NF's and everyone agreed that a good Committee has been appointed.

Grumbine suggested that the Association encourage, recognize and reward scholastic achievement by offering and awarding scholarships to children, grandchildren and dependents of SFSRA members, setting up qualifications etc.

No action was taken on any contributions pending a review of finances between the Budget Officer- Treasurer.

A lot of discussion was had about our meetings for this year. The next one is planned for March 18** St. Patrick's Day - wont ye-ed be featured, since my father was born in Ireland! A June meeting - the picnic-golf get-to-gether and the final meeting in December. *Day after St. Pat's Day. See correct announcement herein.

Talked a lot about programs for the year since the Ozark people offered to come and

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Another meeting of the Board is scheduled for the early part of March to iron out a few items that need to be taken care of.

It is noted from VOL. I, #2, Dixie Ranger of June 1971, John Adams was appointed as Chairman of this Committee. John served on this Committee until he retired and moved West and Bill Fischer was named Chairman for 1975. From the beginning of this Committee in '71, a project was undertaken to collect historical data and George K. Schaeffer was placed in charge of this project. George did a lot of work - and a lot of hard work it was - and through his efforts collected old Forest Service directories from various offices and individuals and the project is now complete, to the extent that all the records were turned over to the Regional Office and the finished project consists of three volumnes of complete directories of the entire region from 1934 -1974 inclusive, as follows:

Volume I - Southern Region & SE Area (RO)
Volume II - Southern Region Field Units(Pt.I)
Volume III - Southern Region Field Units (Pt.II)

Volume III also contains proclamation dates for establishment of national forests in the South and the honor roll of R-8 Forest Service personnel in the armed forces-April 1945. This set (Vol. I-III incl) is for sale at \$3.00 per set. Order should be sent to Shirley McNelly, Secretary of the Southern Forest Service Hetiree Assoc., 1720 Peachtree Rd. NW., Atlanta, Ga. 30309, with check payable to U. S. D. A. - Forest Service. The deadline for receipt of orders is April 15. When all orders have been received as of April 15, the entire amount submitted will be turned over to the Fiscal Agent for deposit and the complete sets will be mailed to each individual who has ordered one or more. (I hope to have an order blank included for convenience in ordering). (Ed's note - I already have a set of these directories and they are well worth the \$3.00 fee.
