DELIVERY OF THE DIXIE RANGER

We continue to get complaints about the slow delivery of the newsletter and the reason is that our permit, under which we are classed as "bulk mail" is the slowest type of delivery. An effort is being made to resubmit our request to be declared "non-profit" by the PO Department which would not only reduce the mailing cost by 5¢ an issue, but assure of first class delivery service. Since our donations to non-profit, conservation orientated organizations in the last several years qualifies our Association to another chance, we hope to convince the PODept. we should be issued a permit as a "non-profit" organization. As mentioned before - if you get acquainted with your mail man, you might talk him into doing something about his bulk mail, which you are anxious to receive. We have been told by the PODept. that "bulk mail" can take as long as two or more weeks for delivery. We're trying to do something about it. You can help too on your end of the line.

OTHER MEDIA

We continue to get newsletters and circulars from the organizations such as ours. I try to weed out items of interest concerning people you know and here is a statement that is hard to understand: While we get newsletters from the various Regional Offices throughout these United States, we still have not been able to get any communications from our own Regional Office or any of the National Forest offices within Region 8. Personally, I have written to them: our members on the National Forest have sent in items; I've attended the stag parties for the Forest Supervisors here and have begged to be put on their mailing list - with no result whatsoever.
